

COURAGEOUS EXPLORATIONS

Task Overview:

The purpose of the Aspire Learning Portfolio is to provide a clearer understanding of the students' critical, creative, inquiry and evaluative skills. Within this Learning Portfolio, high potential and gifted students will explore the concept of 'Courage' through a multidisciplinary approach, allowing them to showcase their capabilities and potential in one or more of the four Domains of Learning.

Students will engage in investigations, critical and creative expression, real-world applications, and personal reflection to demonstrate their understanding of 'Courage' and apply their unique strengths and skills to do so.

Each section of the Learning Portfolio is designed to demonstrate different skills and knowledge of the student, and to highlight areas of potential or giftedness. Each section has the task requirement, guiding questions, and there is also an exemplar and marking criteria at the end of the document to support the completion of this Learning Portfolio. The guiding questions are not set questions students have to address in their responses but are designed to guide the thinking and development process of each section of the Learning Portfolio.

The completed Learning Portfolio is to be brought along to the student's interview, held in Week 3 of Term 3.

Section 1: Historical Exploration

In this first section, students are required to select an historical event or figure that exemplifies the concept of 'Courage'. Students should provide an overview of what they find in their investigation and examine the relevance of how/why it has been important in developing their understanding of 'Courage'.

This section can be in any format that you choose but should be equivalent to 300 words of written information. **See Appendix 2 for a list of example presentation formats to choose from.**

Guiding Questions:

- What historical event or figure do you find particularly courageous? You can conduct research on this to deepen your understanding.
- What specific actions or qualities demonstrate courage in the context of your investigation?
- How did the historical context influence the display of courage? Why do you think this might be?
- Do you think that the same event/figure in the modern world today would have the same implications/impacts? Why or why not?

Section 2: Creative Expression

In this section, students need to demonstrate their understanding of the concept of 'Courage', by choosing a mode of expression that best suits them, their skills, talents, and interests. They should take into consideration how their chosen medium allows them to convey the concept of courage and how it relates to their area of giftedness or potential.

Some examples of presentation formats for this include, but are not limited to:

Intellectual Domain – an essay; write a newspaper article; hold a mock court case.

Creative Domain – compose a song/rap; create a short documentary; design a comic strip story; write and perform a skit.

Physical Domain – create a sporting event; make an instructional video; create a hands-on gameshow; create and perform a cheer.

Social-Emotional Domain – design an awareness campaign; hold a discussion panel/debate with “experts”; assemble a time capsule; write an advice column or newsletter.

This section can be in any format that you choose but should be equivalent to 300 words of written information. **See Appendix 2 for a list of example presentation formats to choose from.**

Students should include the following elements:

1. Their own definition/understanding of what 'Courage' is.
2. What the purpose or relevance of 'Courage' is in the modern world.
3. Ways that you can grow/build 'Courage' as an individual/group.

Guiding Questions:

- What is courage to you, and why is it important to have in the world today?
- How does your chosen mode of expression allow you to convey the concept of 'Courage'?
- In what ways does your creative expression reflect your understanding of 'Courage'?

Section 3: Real-World Application

In this section of the Learning Portfolio, students will be required to identify a real-world problem or issue that requires courage to address. Students should clearly outline the problem/issue, propose a solution, and consider the potential impacts and challenges of their proposed solution.

This section can be in any format that you choose but should be equivalent to 300 words of written information. **See Appendix 2 for a list of example presentation formats to choose from.**

Guiding Questions:

- Can you apply critical and abstract thinking to identify a real-world problem/issue that requires courage to address or solve?
- What is your proposed solution, and how/why does it work?
- What elements of your solution demonstrate originality and creativity?
- How does courage explicitly tie in with your proposed solution?
- What are the potential outcomes/implications for your proposed solution?
- How can you ensure that your proposed solution is relevant, or has a meaningful impact in the real world?

Section 4: Personal Reflection

In the final section of the Learning Portfolio, students will reflect on an occasion where they demonstrated or witnessed courage. Students should consider emotions, actions, and outcomes of the experience and relate it to their own personal strengths/skills.

This section **MUST** be in a written format and has a minimum requirement of 250 words.

Guiding Questions:

- When have you demonstrated courage or witnessed it?
- How did the experience of demonstrating/witnessing courage impact your growth as a young person?
- What did you learn about yourself/others from this experience, and how does it relate to your understanding of 'Courage'?
- In what ways has this experience influenced your perspective on courage and its relevance in your life and/or the world around you?

Marking Criteria:

The interview panel will be assessing the students' capabilities using the criteria below, which will be collated alongside the data from the Entrance Exam to determine placement of students into the Aspire Program at Wallsend Campus in 2026. Students should aim for Exceeding Expectations in all criteria outlined below. 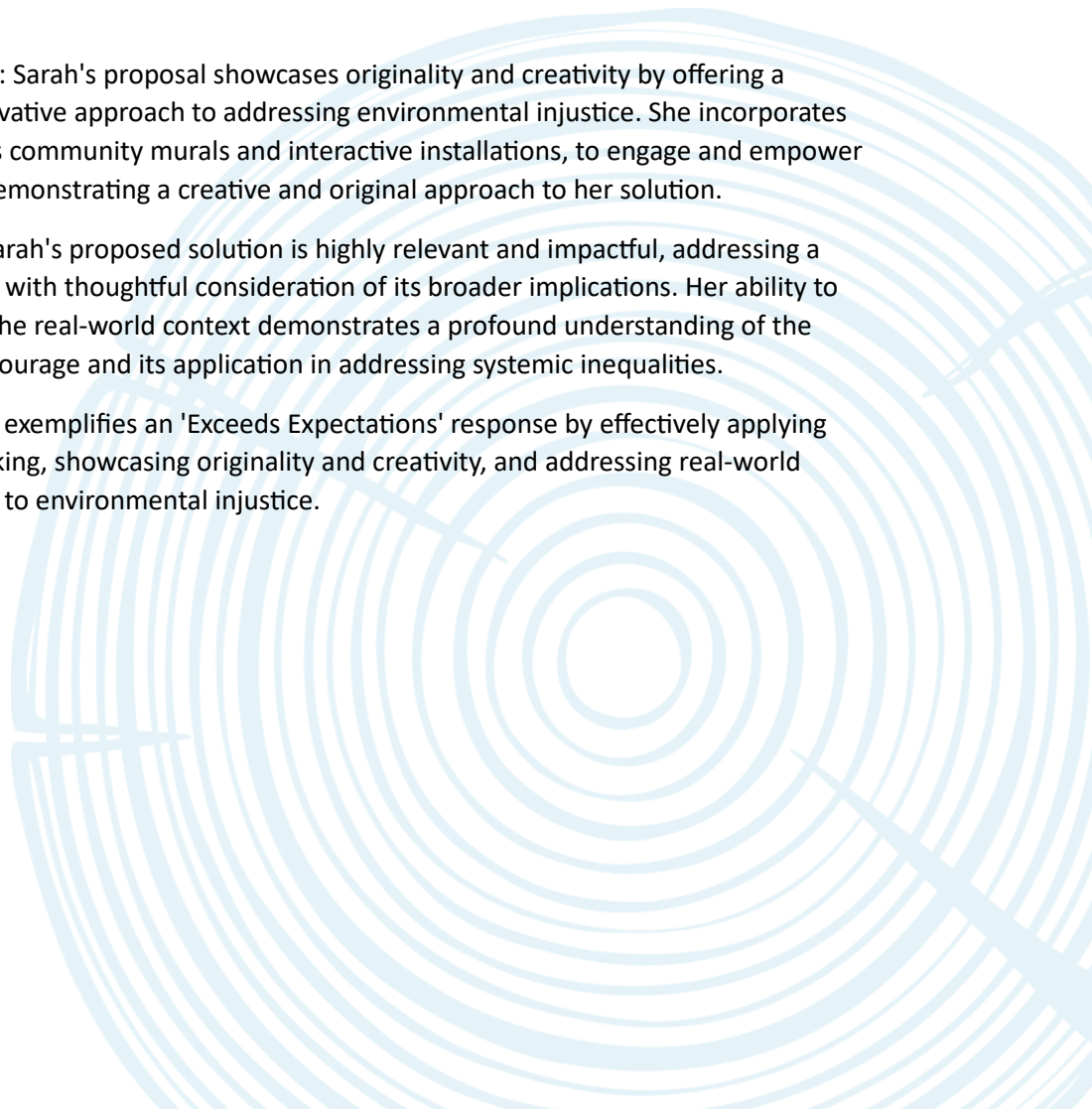
